
THANK YOU GABI AND EVERY BEST WISH




THE STORY OF KNOCK

At about 8 o'clock on the Thursday evening of the 21st of August, 1879, the Blessed Virgin Mary, St. Joseph and St. John the Evangelist appeared at the South gable of the Church at Knock, County Mayo, Ireland. Beside them and a little to the right was an altar with a cross and the figure of a lamb, around which angels hovered. There were fifteen official witnesses to the apparition - young and old - who watched it for two hours in pouring rain and recited the Rosary. Two Commissions of Enquiry accepted their testimony as trust-worth and satisfactory, in 1879 and 1936.

Knock is ranked as an International Eucharistic and Marian Shrine. It has received many Papal honours including the distinction of two Papal visits, that of St. John Paul II in 1979 and Pope Francis in 2018

MASS INTENTION FOR ALL OUR PARISHIONERS IN OUR LADY'S SHRINE AT KNOCK

Dear Parishioners,

The last three months in Ireland was a truly enriching experience for me! Early in the new year I will give a presentation on what I saw and learned in that land so blessed with such beautiful landscapes, literature, music and history. You are all invited to attend my presentation of the sabbatical experience on Tuesday 27 February in the Xavier Centre at 11am. (Details of how to register will be provided early in the new year.)

Opposite is a digital copy of the Mass card I arranged for you all when I visited Knock. It gives a short explanation of the history and the purpose of the Knock shrine. It includes the mosaic inside the Basilica which is composed of more than 1.5 million pieces of glass and marble. Many thousands of people every year from around the world find it a place of prayerfulness and peace. My intention was that the Mass be offered in that sacred place for you all, for your families, and for all who are dear to you.

The vision occurred during the 1879 famine in the West of Ireland. It was not as severe as the Great Famines of 1740-1741 and 1845-1852, causing hunger but not mass deaths. Thus the Shrine at Knock is connected to praying for those who suffer and alleviating their suffering. For example, it has a counselling service within the grounds of the Shrine. And as well as affirming a deep love for Mary, the Shrine emphasises the centrality of faith in Jesus and a deep reverence for the Holy Eucharist.

When the mosaic was unveiled Archbishop of Tuam, Michael Neary said, "May this mosaic be a beacon of light and hope to all who gaze upon it." May it be so for you all.

John 1:6-8. 19-28

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

There stands among you, unknown to you, the one who is coming after me.

A man came, sent by God.

His name was John.

He came as a witness,

as a witness to speak for the light,

so that everyone might believe through him.

He was not the light,

only a witness to speak for the light.

This is how John appeared as a witness. When the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' he not only declared, but he declared quite openly, 'I am not the Christ.' 'Well then,' they asked, 'are you Elijah?' 'I am not,' he said. 'Are you the Prophet?' He answered, 'No.' So they said to him, 'Who are you? We must take back an answer to those who sent us. What have you to say about yourself?' So John said, 'I am, as Isaiah prophesied:

a voice that cries in the wilderness:

Make a straight way for the Lord.'

Now these men had been sent by the Pharisees, and they put this further question to him, 'Why are you baptising if you are not the Christ, and not Elijah, and not the prophet?' John replied, 'I baptise with water; but there stands among you – unknown to you – the one who is coming after me; and I am not fit to undo his sandalstrap.' This happened at Bethany, on the far side of the Jordan, where John was baptising.

Communion Antiphon

Cf Isaiah 35:4

Say to the faint of heart: Be strong and do not fear. Behold, our God will come, and he will save us.

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate Witness to the Light

St John's Gospel never calls John, 'the Baptist'. No, he is John the Witness: 'a witness to speak for the Light'. We discover in this Gospel that this light is embodied in Jesus Christ, most graphically portrayed in the Transfiguration when Christ's body is radiant, translucent, with Divine Light.

Jesus Christ is the light of the world, the One who came to liberate human beings from the many dark captivities which imprison them, the One who vanguished the inky blackness of the tomb.

We can become partakers in the life of this Divine Light. At baptism, this is symbolised by the lighting of a small candle from the great Easter candle which is sung into the church on the Easter Vigil as 'Christ our Light', the Conqueror of Death.

As a baptised people our allegiance to 'The Light' is not to be a private matter between 'me and God'. No, like John, we must bear witness to 'The Light' by being instruments of His power to dispel the darkness which can enshroud people's lives.

We could pause for a moment to commit ourselves to fulfil the promise of our baptismal candle so that we might more authentically celebrate the birth of the Divine Light come into human history.



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
