

MARY, THE HOLY MOTHER OF GOD

Monday 1st January is the Octave Day of Christmas. Eight days ago we began with the joyful celebration of Christ's birth. Now we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God. It is a liturgical feast that looks at the identity of the Child born at Bethlehem through the prism of Mary's true motherhood.

The title Mother of God points to who Jesus is as the "light from light, true God from true God" and it indicates Mary's true relationship with him as his human mother. Jesus is truly the Son of the Most High and is also truly the Word made flesh who dwells among us. He dwelt in the heart and womb of Mary and so began his dwelling among us, his living with us.

One of the aspects of the mystery of Christ's living among us is his growth into maturity and wisdom. In his humanity Jesus grew in understanding through his experience of Mary, Joseph, his relations and friends, playmates and as he became an adult man, his workmates. From this wealth of experience of nature, life and other people he would later draw images and analogies that helped people understand the Kingdom of his Father. Jesus weaved in to his teaching and parables anything from the flowers of the field and the birds evoking God's providential care to images of good and careless workers who were open to the blessings of the kingdom or missed opportunities to receive those blessings.

One lesson we can learn from Jesus is to pay attention to our experience, remember and reflect on it, and see what it teaches us about our life and about our God.

As we begin this New Year of Grace with all its joys and challenges to come, I pray that like Jesus we will experience an ever deeper growth in maturity and wisdom. Christmas leads us back to the beginning of Jesus' life to renew us in our awareness that we begin in God's love. And as we celebrate Mary's Motherhood we are reminded that Jesus the Son of God truly shares our humanity through a beautiful mother. But as the Christmas season comes to its climax with the celebration of Jesus' Baptism and the beginning of his mission to preach the Father's kingdom, we are drawn to look forward with confidence to complete the work given to us in this New Year of Grace.

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate The Liberation of Women

In today's Gospel, Mary, having given birth, is regarded as ritually unclean. She could not take part in public worship until she was 'purified'. This involved offering up a couple of pigeons which she and Joseph had to buy.

No wonder that, at the Cleansing of the Temple, Jesus shatters the cages in which the pigeons were kept! He was angry with a Temple system which saw Mary that way, which thought of all women giving birth that way. Indeed, his whole ministry is full of instances when women breach religious and cultural taboos in his presence, because of his presence.

This Feast of the Holy Family gives us the opportunity to thank God for our mothers who, like Mary, helped fulfil God's plan for humankind by birthing us into the world.

We could pause for a moment to pray that the Church changes rules and structures which confine women in cages built from ideologies foreign to the Gospel, lest those rules become swords which pierce Mary's soul.

Entrance Antiphon

Luke 2:16

The shepherds went in haste, and found Mary and Joseph and the Infant lying in a manger.

First Reading

Genesis 15:1-6. 21:1-3 A reading from the book of Genesis

Your own son shall be your heir.

The word of the Lord was spoken to Abram in a vision, 'Have no fear, Abram, I am your shield; your reward will be very great'. 'My Lord', Abram replied, 'what do you intend to give me? I go childless...' Then Abram said, 'See, you have given me no descendants; some man of my household will be my heir.' And then this word of the Lord was spoken to him, 'He shall not be your heir; your heir shall be one of your own flesh and blood.' Then taking him outside he said, 'Look up to heaven and count the stars if you can. Such will be your descendants,' he told him. Abram put his faith in the Lord, who counted this as making him justified.

The Lord dealt kindly with Sarah as he had said, and did what he had promised her. So Sarah conceived and bore a son to Abraham in his old age, at the time God had promised. Abraham named the son born to him Isaac, the son to whom Sarah had given birth.

Second Reading

Hebrews 11:8. 11-12. 17-19

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

It was by faith that Abraham, when put to the test, offered up Isaac. He offered to sacrifice his only son even though the promises had been made to him and he had been told: It is through Isaac that your name will be carried on. He was confident that God had the power even to raise the dead; and so, figuratively speaking, he was given back Isaac from the dead.

Alleluia, alleluia! In the past God spoke to our fathers through the prophets; now he speaks to us though his Son. Alleluia!

Gospel

Luke 2:22-40

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

The child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom.

When the day came for them to be purified as laid down by the Law of Moses, the parents of Jesus took him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord – observing what stands written in the Law of the Lord: Every first-born male must be consecrated to the Lord – and also to offer in sacrifice, in accordance with what is said in the Law of the Lord, a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons. Now in Jerusalem there was a man named Simeon. He was an upright and devout man; he looked forward to Israel's comforting and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death until he had set eyes on the Christ of the Lord. Prompted by the Spirit he came to the Temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the Law required, he took him into his arms and blessed God; and he said:

- 'Now, Master,
- you can let your servant go in peace,
- just as you promised;
- because my eyes have seen the salvation
- which you have prepared for all the nations to see,
- a light to enlighten the pagans
- and the glory of your people Israel.'

As the child's father and mother stood there wondering at the things that were being said about him, Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother, 'You see this child: he is destined for the fall and for the rising of many in Israel, destined to be a sign that is rejected - and a sword will pierce your own soul too - so that the secret thoughts of many may be laid bare.'

There was a prophetess also, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was well on in years. Her days of girlhood over, she had been married for seven years before becoming a widow. She was now eighty-four years old and never left the Temple, serving God night and day with fasting and prayer. She came by just at that moment and began to praise God; and she spoke of the child to all who looked forward to the deliverance of Jerusalem.

When they had done everything the Law of the Lord required, they went back to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. Meanwhile the child grew to maturity, and he was filled with wisdom; and God's favour was with him.
